Guided 4 private schools to achieve West African Health Organization standards and teach 1,540 nursing and midwifery students from underserved areas



Averted 156,211 unintended pregnancies and 279 maternal deaths from 2021-2024 For two decades, IntraHealth International, now a subsidiary of Global Communities, has collaborated with Senegal's government, civil society organizations, health training institutions, and health workers to strengthen the country's health system. IntraHealth's work has advanced the delivery of high-quality integrated health services to more communities and significantly increased new users of family planning. Our programs in Senegal:

- **Provide an integrated package** of family planning, maternal, newborn, and child health, and nutrition services to mothers and children.
- **Strengthen municipal leadership** to expand and finance proven family planning and maternal, newborn, and child health solutions.
- Increase the number of qualified, well-trained nurses and midwives who can provide quality care to rural and hard-to-reach communities.
- **Use the power of data** to accelerate early detection of hypertension and cardiovascular disease and advocate for greater health sector funding.
- **Position local and regional organizations**, including Senegal-based *Speak Up Africa*, to lead critical health advocacy and programming.

INSPiRE: Women's and Newborn Health in West Africa (2017–2027)

IntraHealth and government stakeholders in nine Ouagadougou Partnership countries, including Senegal, developed the **INSPiRE integration model**, focusing on the four essential points of contact between mothers and children and the health system: prenatal consultation, delivery, postnatal care, and monitoring of children's growth and vaccination. The model promotes identification of family planning as well as other health needs, such as maternal and newborn nutrition practices, vaccinations, and screening for cervical and breast cancer. Implementation of this model—including training providers in integrated service provision using a hybrid on-the-job mentoring + eLearning approach—is coordinated through a technical working group in each country and a regional community of practice, encouraging local ownership and sustainability.

In Senegal, 38 districts (48% of national coverage) across Fatick, Matam, Sediou, Kedougou, Diourbel, Ziguinchor, Saint-Louis, Dakar, Thies, and Kolda regions have scaled up the INSPiRE integration model, with leaders mobilizing resources to further accelerate national scale-up. Between 2019 to 2023, the INSPiRE model's regional results include:

- An overall **123% increase in new family** planning users
- **A 380% increase in well-baby visits** for growth monitoring; among the children who were monitored, fewer than 1 child in 100 presented with acute malnutrition in 2023.

INSPIRE III (2023-2027) continues to advocate for and expand use of integrated services by sharing impact evaluation and cost study findings and supporting national leaders and technical working groups to finance and scale the model and measure its impact on the use of antenatal, postnatal, newborn, and post-partum family planning services.

The Challenge Initiative (TCI) Next Gen (2021–2025)

As the lead of TCI's Francophone West Africa Hub, IntraHealth supports 29 cities in Senegal, Côte d'Ivoire, Niger, Togo, Benin, and Burkina Faso to rapidly scale up proven family planning high-impact practices (HIPs) and adolescent and youth sexual and reproductive health services. Through technical and management coaching, IntraHealth supports local governments to sustain improvements in urban health systems and increase use of modern contraception by offering a core package of HIPs, including free family planning special days; postpartum family planning services; universal referral; and family planning outreach and education via mass media, community health workers, and FP champions.

Maximizing Program Synergies to Advance Family Planning Uptake

Recognizing the shared geographical focus and complementary approaches of INSPiRE and The Challenge Initiative (TCI), funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, IntraHealth initiated collaboration between these programs in 2023 to capitalize on synergies, expand best practices, and pool collective resources.

In Pikine and Touba, Senegal, IntraHealth trained 157 nurses and midwives in both INSPIRE and TCI approaches, enhancing their capacity to deliver integrated services.

We also trained 285 community health workers to promote contraceptive use in their communities and facilitate referrals to health facilities.

Using these approaches in Senegal across 11 cities and 17 health districts (covering 438 health facilities), TCI has:

- Coached 791 health providers and 1,284 community health workers on TCI HIPs and high-impact interventions
- Trained 147 health providers on contraceptive technologies and 569 health providers on universal referral methods
- Enrolled 30,863 additional family planning clients as of December 2024
- Averted 156,211 unintended pregnancies as of December 2024
- Averted 279 maternal deaths as of December 2024
- Oriented 277 local elected officials on family planning HIPs and adolescent/youth sexual and reproductive health services

Positioning Speak Up Africa to Lead Regional Family Planning Advocacy and Programming

The Ouagadougou Partnership (OP) was established in 2011 to support collaboration among nine countries in West Africa to address high levels of unmet need for family planning. As a family planning thought leader in West Africa, IntraHealth was selected by the OP donors to administratively host and support the functioning of the OP Coordination Unit.

In 2021, as part of our localization approach, IntraHealth transitioned its administrative and financial services for the OP Coordination Unit to a leading Senegal-based organization, Speak Up Africa, to continue critical regional advocacy and programmatic work for family planning.

With initial support from IntraHealth, Speak Up Africa now independently oversees the OP Coordination Unit's staffing, partner management, financial management, and grant management.

Classroom to Care (C2C) (2021–2026)

IntraHealth works with 12 private schools in Senegal, Niger, and Mali to sustainably increase the number of qualified, well-trained nurses and midwives who can serve rural communities in these countries—all of which face a critical shortage of health workers. IntraHealth helps four private schools in each country partner with the public sector, achieve the appropriate accreditations, enhance competency-based curricula, create effective learning approaches, and graduate students from underserved areas.

As part of its support, IntraHealth helped develop capacity-strengthening plans for each school, roll out a six-semester eLearning curriculum on maternal and child health, equip 12 skills labs with tools for handson training, and equip nine clinical practicum sites with high-tech simulation equipment. Now at the end of the third year of the project, **6,912 nursing and midwifery students—73.7% of whom are women—are benefiting from updated curricula adapted to local clinical practice.**

In Senegal, IntraHealth works with four private schools in Thies, Kaolack, Saint Louis, and Kolda regions to give equal access to quality training to communities in rural areas that are often difficult to reach and far from the capital. The project's initial achievements in Senegal have enabled the four private schools to:

- Achieve accreditation under West African Health Organization standards and use competencybased curricula, practical teaching aids, digital learning tools, and clinical simulation labs to train more than 200 teachers and coaches and teach 1,540 nursing & midwifery students
- Deploy diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) practices, including infrastructure upgrades and curriculum updates, to increase the number of graduates from marginalized communities and vulnerable groups.

CARDIO4Dakar (2022–2024)

FUNDER: Novartis Foundation

CARDIO4Dakar expanded the work of the Better Hearts, Better Cities project (2017-2021), where IntraHealth partnered with Senegal's Ministry of Health and Social Action to test evidence-based, scalable approaches in Dakar to thwart the rise of hypertension and other noncommunicable diseases (NCDs). With CARDIO4Dakar, we expanded this partnership by **co-creating four performance-based district grants** to implement the CARDIO package, including working with community groups to **produce geospatial maps** that guided targeted NCD outreach and facilitated referrals to care. We also helped the ministry to **develop cardiovascular disease eLearning courses and an eTracker dashboard**, linked to HMIS (DHIS2), to enable longitudinal tracking of patients over time and reduce loss to follow-up.

MOMENTUM Safe Surgery in Family Planning & Obstetrics (2020–2025) FUNDER: USAID

In Senegal, IntraHealth led comprehensive training and technical assistance for local organizations and health workers to **address key skill gaps in providing longacting reversible contraception (LARC), permanent methods, and maternal health services in Dakar and the surrounding regions**.

Our technical assistance improved access to and quality of voluntary, informed, consented, and safe surgical care for both family planning and obstetrics, with a focus on peripartum hysterectomy; prevention of unnecessary caesarean delivery; prevention and treatment of obstetric and iatrogenic fistula; and voluntary family planning.
